ASA hosts Legislative Fly-In, sets advocacy agenda

On May 3 and 4, 2011, more than 30 dedicated members of the American Supply Association came to Washington, D.C., for ASA's Legislative Fly-In. The event kicked off with a discussion on the state of

On Wednesday, May 4, ASA members kicked off their day listening to Congressman Peter Roskam (R-IL) describe the looming challenges that face our economy.
